



## **Notice to Mariners No 23 of 2021**

### **Jersey Territorial Waters**

#### **Private marine vessels travelling to and from the European Union as a result of the UK leaving the EU**

Mariners are advised of the following requirements relating to all private marine vessels travelling between the European Union and Jersey as a result of the UK leaving the EU.

For vessels arriving in Jersey, please ensure you are aware of the latest Covid-19 pre-arrival requirements that may be in force.

#### **1. Private marine vessels travelling to the European Union**

On their first arrival in France from Jersey, vessels are required to clear Customs and Immigration at a designated port of arrival. The requirement will be to notify the port authority at that designated port of their arrival by completing a declaration which is e-mailed to the relevant port authority. The port authority will notify the relevant border officials.

The designated ports (Points de Passage Frontalier or PPF) relevant to the Channel Islands are Brest, Carteret, Cherbourg, Granville, Roscoff, St Brieuc and St Malo.

If, in exceptional circumstances, a vessel's first port of arrival is not a designated port, that port authority must be notified to allow entry.

British nationals arriving in France may be required to have their passports stamped on arrival in, and departure from, France.

#### **2. Private marine vessels arriving in Jersey**

**The below Customs & Immigration requirements are in addition to any existing health-related requirements for persons arriving in the Bailiwick of Jersey.**

All persons arriving on a private vessel from outside the Common Travel Area (comprising of Jersey, Guernsey, UK, Ireland and Isle of Man) and who are not either a British or Irish national must complete a Maritime Customs and Immigration Declaration prior to arrival in Jersey or immediately on their arrival.

A Maritime Customs and Immigration Declaration must also be submitted in any circumstances if you have goods to declare and have arrived from outside the Bailiwick of Jersey.

Currently, due to Covid-19 restrictions, visiting mariners may only disembark in Jersey at the port of St Helier.

If you have not submitted a declaration in advance of your travel a yellow 'Q' flag must be raised and a Maritime Customs and Immigration Declaration submitted immediately on arrival.

If you are unable to submit the declaration on your personal device, facilities will be available at St Helier Marina Office.

All persons must remain in the port area on their vessel until a Maritime Customs and Immigration Declaration has been submitted.

On submission of the form those nationals listed below **who do not intend to work, study or settle in Jersey** will be free to leave the port area, subject to current Covid 19 requirements, and will have immigration permission **to visit Jersey for up to 6 months, they cannot work or access public funds.**

For all other nationals or those listed above that intend to work, study or settle in Jersey and do not have EU pre-settled or settled status must remain in the port area on board their vessel until granted Immigration clearance by the Jersey Customs & Immigration Service.
